- Students will identify (point to) visual prompts of a newspaper, a magazine, and a sign. The prompts include a display of more than one example of each type of informational text. The items in the display are novel to the student. (They are different from the informational texts that the students have viewed during daily lessons.) The teacher asks the student to identify the texts of each type: newspaper, magazine, sign (picture of church building sign). (ELA-I6)
